General Assistance/ General Relief	 Minors are eligible to receive GR if they are not eligible for any other state or federal benefit Some counties have specific language allowing minors to receive GA/GR Counties with minimum age policies (Fresno) or those that provide county discretion must still comply with§17000 The county GA/GR duty applies to "all incompetent, poor, indigent persons, and those incapacitated by age, disease, or accident, lawfully resident therein, when such persons are not supported and relieved" 	See McCormick v. County of Alameda (2011) 193 Cal.App.4th 201.	
CalWorks/ TANF	 Child may be eligible even where a parent or caregiver is not (immigration statues, receipt of a "greater" benefit, etc) Cal-Learn – up to age 20 or to receipt of HS diploma or equivalent – who are custodial parents or in 3rd trimester Minor Parents: Counties may refuse to pay CalWORKs directly to a minor parent Minor parents are required to live with a parent, guardian, or licensed provider and that individual acts as the payee Exceptions – parent is deceased or missing; CPS concludes that living with the parent jeopardizes health or safety; minor has lived apart from parents for more than a year MPP 89-201 Child Welfare Reporting Nonminor Dependents (Foster Youth 18-21): Income calculation is different for foster youth residing in THP-NMD Standard monthly rate for THP-NMD is set at \$2,654/ mo (Host Family) and \$3,336/ mo (Remote and Single Site)
